What is bullying?



Bullying is the repetitive, intentional hurting of one person or group by another person or group, where the relationship involves an imbalance of power. It can be verbal, physical or psychological. It can happen online or face to face. (Anti-Bullying Alliance). Bullying is generally characterised by:

- **Repetition:** Incidents are not one-offs; they are frequent and happen over an extended period of time.
- Intent: The perpetrator means to cause verbal, physical or emotional harm; it is not accidental.
- Targeting: Bullying is generally targeted at a specific individual or group.
- **Power imbalance:** Whether real or perceived, bullying is generally based on unequal power relations.

How we respond to allegations or incidents of bullying:

How we respond to allegations or incidents of bullying:

- Investigation by a school leader or member of our safeguarding team
- Speaking to families
- Perceived Bullying Plan
- Find appropriate consequences and support for the perpetrator
- Ensure support and reassurance for the victim
- Monitoring
- Check-ins

Pastoral Support/Mental Health Support

Tier 1 Universal Support

Support at this level is a low-level intervention which is bespoke to the pupil. This includes addressing the pupil's level of need with a solution-focused approach. It could include calling parents in, introducing buddies or reducing pressures. All members of staff are mental health trained (Safer Schools App), so whoever the pupil choices as their trusted adult will be able to support. Pupils all have access to the pastoral team and the Pastoral Room is open at lunchtimes.

Tier 2: Teachers would complete a RAP Pastoral Sheet

Pastoral support including but not limited to: drawing and talking therapy, 1:1 sessions, lunchtime sessions group work, confidence sessions, 1:1/small group Forest School etc. Parents/Carers would be spoken to about the concerns and any referrals to School Nurse/MHST/other agency support completed. **Tier 3:**

Support at this level: Mental Health Support Teams, bank of services to get involved 'resources directory', numbers to give to parents etc.

Tier 4:

Support at this level: GP services, CAMHS (this referral can come from GP (via parents) or

school, Inclusion Support – Educational Psychologist

Tier 5:

Crisis Team intervention when a child is believed to be at risk







Targeted Support: Mental Health

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Tier 1 Universal Support: Assemblies Displays/helplines PSHE curriculum Class teacher/TA support Mental health for parents and community

Tier 2 Low Level Concerns: Specific support from School Nurse drop in Regular work with Pastoral Team Safe space Support Teams

Tier 3 Medium Level Concerns: Mental Health Support Team referral GP/Medical Professional Targeted approach and bespoke programme of support Tier 4 High Level Concerns: Support at this level usually involves responding to complex or specific mental health needs requiring intervention from CAHMS.
